





Mentors —their roles and functions in the ENRICH Course

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Introduction

- The ENRICH CPD Course is at the core of the ENRICH Project
- Ensuring active participation in the ENRICH Course is paramount
- Due to its innovative character, some of the subjects presented and compulsory activities required in the ENRICH Course can be perceived as demanding
- Through this Course, the ENRICH Consortium aims to prompt the development of a spawning teacher community that is sensitive to the issues discussed and willing to exchange suggestions and experiences







General orientation: What does a Mentor do?

What is a Mentor? **Generic definition**:

 A co-worker, a co-thinker, a guide, a critical friend, an 'educational companion' (Feiman-Nemser, 2001, p.20) who facilitates and fosters the mentee's professional development while viewing their relationship as a means towards one's own improvement and advancement (e.g. Wallace and Gravells, 2007)







General orientation: What does a Mentor do?

More specifically, in teacher education contexts, mentors:

- Provide general support:
 - Encourage teachers to engage with the content of a course and help them clarify certain concepts that may be obscure to them
 - Offer emotional support, when needed
- Respond to individual teacher needs:
 - prompt active participation from individual teachers, e.g., with assignments, activities, lesson plans, etc., in a relevant and appropriate way







Why do we have Mentors in the ENRICH Course?

To ensure that participants:

- Follow the Study Schedule of the Course
- Are engaged with the online sections and materials
- Share their reactions and responses to the Compulsory Activities
- Are confident that their engagement with the Course content and activities helps them to learn and grow as professionals







Idiosyncrasies of the ENRICH CPD Course

- One Course developed "centrally"
- The Course materials are all made available online
- Participant teachers are based in different countries (Greece, Italy, Norway, Portugal, Turkey and others)
- Participant teachers are likely to have different teaching profiles and constraints depending on the local national context







How does the mentoring system work in ENRICH?

In the ENRICH Course, there are **TWO types** of Mentors:

- Type A: Course or Moodle Mentors
 - In each section, a scholar who has been involved in its development acts as the Course/Moodle Mentor
 - Main focus: The participants working in that section
- Type B: Local Mentors
 - In each country, a scholar who is a member of the ENRICH consortium acts as a Local Mentor
 - Main focus: The participants coming from each country or are integrated in that local group







How does the mentoring system work in ENRICH?

Both types of Mentors:

- Facilitate study and active engagement with the materials and activities
- Trigger constructive dialogue and prompt a team spirit among the participants
- Support the participants and promote autonomy

A person may act both as a **Course/Moodle Mentor** in a specific section (if he/she has been involved in its development) and as a **Local Mentor** (of the participants coming from his/her country)







 The Course/Moodle Mentors are responsible for the participants who work on their section, no matter what country they come from

Their role is to:

- Trigger discussion on topics related to that section
- Give constructive feedback, as they see fit
- o Provide **further resources**, as they see fit

• They **DO NOT**:

- Teach the Course—this is what the video is there for
- Correct or offer 'ready-made' answers—a teacher is in the best position to determine what is good practice in his/her own context!







Where can you find the Course/Moodle Mentors?

- The Course/Moodle Mentors can be found in the **Forums of each section**—see this symbol: \bigcirc
- More specifically, you can find them in:
 - The Forum dedicated to a particular Activity, either that be Compulsory or not
 - The Forum dedicated to General discussion—you can use this Forum to discuss any OTHER issue you want related to this section







 For example, in the section "The Content of ELF-aware teaching", you can find the Course/Moodle Mentor:



[Note: Activity 3 is a Compulsory Activity—the box next to it will be automatically ticked after completing it]







When can you find the Course/Moodle Mentors?

- The Course/Moodle Mentor can be found in the Forums of his/her section during the strict period when that section is activated, according to the Study Schedule
- For example, you can find the Course/Moodle Mentor of the section "The content of ELF-aware teaching" during Week 8, i.e. from 23/03/2020 till 29/03/2020







Type B: Local Mentors

• The Local Mentors are responsible for participants coming from their country (e.g. Italy, Greece) or are integrated in that local group

Their role is to:

- Carry out 3 meetings with their local group
- Respond to issues or problems participants of their local group may raise, as they see fit
- Clarify issues about the completion of the course, such as about deadlines and the final assignment

Again, Local Mentors <u>DO NOT</u>:

- Teach the Course
- Correct or offer 'ready-made' answers







Type B: Local Mentors
