# What you are required to do now (in a nutshell)

- 1 Design an ELF-aware lesson plan
  - Use your understanding of the input of this Course and your own teaching context
- (2) Teach that ELF-aware lesson

- (3) Evaluate the ELF-aware lesson taught
  - Refer back to the Course input







#### 1—Designing the lesson plan

- Focus on a classroom context that you know very well—depending on your context draw out information on:
  - ✓ the profile of your **learners** (3.1.2)
  - $\checkmark$  the target situation (2; 3.1)
  - ✓ teaching **methodologies** (2.3)
- Think on issues that concern you and your classroom that are **ELF-related**:
  - ✓ your own understanding of **ELF** (1.1)
  - ✓ your learners' language and cultural background (1.2)







### 1—Designing the lesson plan

- Focus on your syllabus and textbook—how do they approach:
  - $\checkmark$  the teaching of **cultural issues** (2.2.2)
  - ✓ the extent to which it is possible to integrate an awareness of **TBL**, **CLIL**, **ICT or corpora** (2.3.1 to 2.3.4)
  - $\checkmark$  assessment (2.4)
- Decide on the **focus of your lesson**:
  - ✓ which **skills and subskills**?
  - ✓ are you developing an entirely original lesson or are you adapting an existing (textbook) lesson (or activities)?
  - ✓ your **policy** regarding: teacher/learner roles. correction/feedback







## 1—Designing the lesson plan

- Develop a lesson plan using:
  - ✓ The principles of **ELF-aware teaching** (2.1 and 2.2)
  - ✓ the criteria and templates provided in the Lesson Planning and Evaluation section (2.5)

#### 2—Teaching the lesson

Know and follow your lesson plan

Record (audio/video) your lesson







### 3—Evaluating the lesson

**Step 1**—**Upon finishing** teaching the lesson, have your notebook handy and jot down, 3-4 lines,

- ✓ Your overall evaluation of the lesson
- ✓ <u>ANY observation of ANY issue</u> (however big or small) that attracted your attention while teaching (that you did not want to forget about)

Step 2—2-3 days after the lesson, play back the recording of the lesson and make notes on its minute-by-minute development







### 3—Evaluating the lesson

**Step 3**—Now go back to your original lesson plan:

- ✓ Notice any **discrepancies** bt. it and the lesson
- ✓ Note down what you would do differently

**Step 4**—Compare, contrast and study the lesson plan and the lesson taught vis-à-vis the **principles** encountered within:

- **✓ ELF awareness** (2.1 <u>and</u> 2.2)
- **✓ Big/small cultures** (2.2.2)
- **✓ Teaching methodology (2.3)**

- 1 What were your **initial intentions** while designing the lesson?
- 2 What did you **do differently than previously** as teacher of this specific class?
- (3) How did your **learners react** to the lesson?
- 4 Did your **learners produce ELF**? How would you describe that ELF?
- (5) What have you **learned from this experience**?
- 6 Write down the one single-most important challenge from this assignment
- 7 Write down the one single-most important thing that you learned from this assignment
