**<u>Step 3</u>**—Now go back to your original lesson plan:

- ✓ Notice any **discrepancies** between the plan and the lesson
- ✓ Note down what you would do differently

**<u>Step 4</u>**—Compare, contrast and study the lesson plan and the lesson taught visà-vis the **principles** encountered within:

- ✓ **ELF awareness** (2.1 <u>and</u> 2.2)
- ✓ Large/small cultures (2.2.2)
- ✓ **Teaching methodology** (2.3)
- ✓ The other sections in the Course that are relevant to your specific lesson (e.g., Task-based learning, CLIL, etc.).
